



Our Mission

The Near Northwest Neighborhood, Inc. is an organization of diverse members dedicated to the preservation and revitalization of the neighborhood through:

In 2022, the NNN was able to complete and sell five homes to income-qualified families, and begin the process to complete five more. But while our homeownership program continues to be a strength of the NNN, we're extremely pleased to build on our affordable rental work - a goal that the NNN Board put in front of us five years ago, and that we are seeing in "bricks and mortar" now as a duplex and four-plex project are underway, with more to come.

The families impacted by our work are young and old, small and large, of all races, of so many different walks of life. We know that "affordable housing" is the stability that offers families a huge stepping off point for their lives - but that also brings life and stability to our neighborhood as a whole.




Places

A Powerful Neighborhood for All

NNN Community Engagement and Organizing is core to our Mission. We know that relationships are what make our neighborhood thrive. Often, when we talk about what the NNN is doing - we're talking about what NNN neighbors are doing, giving, offering, and creating. And all with a focus on inclusion. In 2022, the NNN and NNN neighbors shared the following resources, among too many to list:

- Financial Courses from Basic to Homeownership
- Exploring a Small Loan community with Holy Cross Parish
- Forwarding an IGNITE grant proposal to upgrade the Booker T. West playground at St. Paul Bethel Baptist Church and open it to the community
- Hosting the South Bend Lead Affinity Group, seeking to prevent lead poisoning in the County
 - Public Safety planning, listening, and community efforts
- Community dinners and gatherings
- Farmers Markets, Pop-Up Food Pantries, Photography classes, Kids cooking classes, and much much more!
- HUGE efforts and partnerships with Community Partners including: Hope for the Hungry, Portage Farmstands, Miss Kim's Cooking Classes, REAL Services, the City of South Bend, and many more.

2022 Powerful Numbers

The Local Cup is in it's 8th year as our NNN Local Pay-It-Forward coffee shop, led by NNN neighbor, Aireal Newbill. The Local Cup employs local high school interns, and St. Mary's College work-study students. The Local Cup is open 4 days a week, and guarantees good conversation and great coffee.





Zero can be a powerful number. Four new construction homes were completed in the NNN in 2022, utilizing an Energy Efficient "Net Zero" Housing construction style that allows for much great insulative value to the home. This will minimize energy needs, and provide excellent long-term affordability for these homebuyers. We've been delighted to work with Provision Builders, and Borkholder Buildings, to create and build these new NNN homes.

Three Series of Financial Readiness Classes were held in 2022 at the NNN, with a total of 39 students participating. These classes offer information about how to "face the finances" and be "money smart", but also offer a safe place to seek financial improvement. Thank you to Marce Bingham (NNN Board Member) and Andre Northern (NNN Community Organizer) for creating and leading these classes!





How can you count the number of helping hands? One volunteer at a time. NNN Neighbors and community volunteers make our neighborhood events run, and shine. They walk the neighborhood and deliver newsletters. They create new initiatives, and run programs in the NNN Community Center. While we work powerfully in groups - we know that each singular helper and volunteer that gives to the NNN and the neighborhood makes a better community, one offer at a time, whether with two hands, two feet, one smile, or all of the above.
