# **Introducing our Community Outreach Team**

We are thrilled to have a three-person Community Outreach Team join our work for this year. Kim Brantley, Emily Dean and Kim Clowers (left to right, below) started their part-time roles in December with orientation to the neighborhood and issues of lead contamination. The second week of January, they participated in a 40-hour training for Community Health Workers in Hammond, IN. They will soon be knocking on doors and connecting with neighbors.

\* Emily Dean moved to the neighborhood last year with her husband who is studying at Notre Dame. Previously, she taught high school history in a racially and culturally diverse school system in Virginia. Emily has twopreschool age children.

\* Kim Clowers helped start an anti-violence initiative in the Fremont Park neighborhood after a series of shootings there. She helped organize a block-party that drew six hundred people, and started a literacy program and peace circles for children. For a time she was a NNN neighbor, living on Diamond Ave.

Our Community Outreach Team will focus on the problem of high levels of lead contamination in our neighborhood. They will be building relationships with many families in Census Tract 6 with children under the age of seven. One goal will be to increase the percentage of children who have been tested for lead contamination. (Only 8% of the children have been tested in recent years).

This work is funded for one year by an environmental justice grant from the EPA and a matching grant from the St. Joseph County Community Foundation.

We have an awesome trio, that brings a wide range of relationships and experiences to us. Please welcome our Community Outreach Team and introduce them to other neighbors. If you would like to be contacted by the Community Outreach Team, please call or email us at the Office.

## The Art of Neighboring

#### Thoughts from your "Neighborhood Networker" André Gingerich Stoner

The Near Northwest Neighborhood includes an amazing mix of people. Like America as a whole, we are a racially and economically diverse community. But unlike much of America, people of different backgrounds live right next to each other and rub shoulders every day. This poses challenges, but also remarkable opportunities.

I have a dream of a neighborhood where each person is seen and heard, their experiences and stories are honored, and their gifts and perspectives are valued. Imagine with me a community that is a demonstration plot for how people who are quite different learn to respect each other, recognize differences and look out for each other's well-being. Each day, I already see glimpses of that. What would it take for this to be commonplace?

"Cultural humility" is a term I've recently encountered. This phrase captures a number of things. For one, it requires self-awareness of one's own cultural background and biases. It also suggests acknowledging how much we don't know about other cultures. I think this is especially true for White people, like me, who have rarely studied, worked or worshipped in settings run by people of other cultures.

"Cultural humility" also suggests we approach other cultures with curiosity and openness, rather than judgement. Sometimes we are surprised. I was humbled, for example, when I realized that middle-class culture tends to value saving and keeping for oneself, while people in poverty often put a premium on relationships and sharing what they have. Which is better?

And "cultural humility" requires a willingness to acknowledge the history, pain and past hurts of our own communities as well as others. Racial discrimination and injustice is an integral part of U.S. history. Becoming a community where each person is seen and heard means taking those experiences seriously and working together to create a different future.

Will you join me in learning and practicing cultural humility?

# **Organizing Project Steering Committee**

Last year, with help from our Neighborhood Networker, Andre Stoner, the NNN has strengthened and built new relationships with leaders across the community and hosted trainings in one-on-one relational meetings. This helped build a base for the NNN to give leadership to pressing issues of lead contamination and the possibilities of our Portage grocery down-sizing or closing.

Now, seven leaders in the neighborhood have stepped up to give support and direction to our ongoing community organizing work. This committee is forming, distinct from the NNN Board of Directors, to increase leadership opportunities, and the voice of neighbors regarding issues which impact our neighborhood. They will listen to neighbors, strategize about current work and help identify other specific issues affecting our neighborhood where we can make a difference. This Steering Committee met for the first time in December.

## **Coal Line Trail Update**

The City of South Bend has updated us on the Coal Line Trail, which is an anticipated recreational trail connecting the South West Edge of the NNN with the East Bank Trail. It will be constructed in Phases and there will be future Public Meetings as planning for the trail progresses.

# Never too Young to be an Effective Change Agent

An established youth empowerment development program will be joining us in the NNN this semester. We are very glad to welcome *Engaging Youth, Engaging Neighborhoods* as a partner site for this spring.

*Engaging Youth, Engaging Neighborhoods* (**EYEN**) is a collaborative program between Neighborhood Resources Connection (NRC) and University of Notre Dame professors and researchers, Maria McKenna and Stuart Green. The program which began in 2011 develops youth empowerment by demonstrating how youth participants can become effective change agents in their local neighborhoods and communities.

Through the program, students explore their neighborhoods and use a research method called Photovoice to tell the story of their community through photographs. Using art, photography, and other forms of literacy, the program encourages youth to reflect on experiences, make connections in their neighborhoods, and work on justice issues and selfdetermination.

EYEN provides an opportunity for youth to learn how to engage in civic life which helps develop a new generation of community leaders. "Key points of EYEN are creating a sense of community, creating a sense of voice, and creating a sense of democratic space," says program partner Stuart Greene, a University of Notre Dame professor.

For 2018, NRC is partnering with the Near Northwest Neighborhood (NNN). Classes will be meeting in the NNN community room, starting January 24th, and exploring parts of the near northwest neighborhood. We will keep you in the loop as the program progresses.

The new Portage Meat and Market has marked over three months in it's new business format.

Manager Doug Kizer and his team are working hard to re-brand the store: concentrating on a smaller, cleaner space, and shifting the product mix. Some neighbors, hoping for greater improvements and investment from the Martin's corporation, have expressed disappointment in the corporation's support.

Others have appreciated the bulk meat offerings; new, lowerpriced items; and other new products neighbors requested. Doug and his team are also developing neighbor-focused customer service that many feel every time they visit the store.

Doug Kizer (<u>dkizer@martins-supermarkets.com</u>) welcomes comments and requests from neighbors. He and the team are actively working on finding the product mix that's right for our neighborhood.

A team of leaders from the NNN and other northwest South Bend neighborhoods have been working diligently to try to understand the long term interests and plans of the grocery and plaza owners and opportunities and challenges this presents for our neighborhoods. The "plaza action team" includes David Hurley, Mike Keen, Rev. Charles King, Pastor Canneth Lee, Apostle Michael Patton, Kathy Schuth, Andre Stoner, John Tugman and Thelma Williams. Feel free to be in touch with any of these individuals to discuss what we are learning.

The City of South Bend has indicated some interest in a public design session for the plaza area. We will send information out with any new developments.

## Mulch Madness: April 14, 2018

As we continue to study lead issues, we are learning that bare soil around homes is a potential major source of lead contamination for children. Mulching around the drip edge of the house can significantly reduce exposure to lead. Because wind and dust can spread lead dust over more than just one yard, mulching a number of adjoining houses is a recommended best practice for reducing lead exposure.

The NNN is working with neighbors and Notre Dame partners to provide and spread mulch in a target area of the neighborhood on April 14, in conjunction with Adopt a Block. We expect to partner with the City of South Bend to deliver mulch to central spots. Neighbors and volunteers can then distribute and spread the mulch. We are looking at several demonstration blocks south of California between Harrison and Allen.

We hope to do a trial run on one block in early March. Contact Andre Stoner, NNN Neighborhood Networker, if you are interested in getting involved. Andre's number is 574.440.4021.
