The Art of Neighboring

The Near Northwest Neighborhood is one of the most racially and economically diverse neighborhoods in South Bend. At the time of the 2010 census, the racial make-up of the neighborhood was 56% white, 33% Black and 10% Latino. This can create some moments of tension, but it is also a real opportunity and strength.

In 1903, the eminent Black man of letters, W.E. B. Du Bois, famously predicted that the issue of the 20th century for America would be "the problem of the color line." Unfortunately, more than one hundred years later, we have not yet achieved "the beloved community" that Martin Luther King, Jr. called us to.

Our culture tends to look at the present moment, without seeing the historical context. One of the rich rewards of my work is hearing the stories of my neighbors. Sometimes it is delightful. Sometimes painful and hard. In the past months, I've heard several stories of why my Black neighbors and their families moved north during "the great migration" -- a teenage boy was scared for his life, because of an interaction with a white adult; a family that fled north because the mother was repeatedly sexually attacked by white men.

I've been pondering again that while my hard-working great-grandfather did well enough for himself to set up each of his sons with fertile Iowa farms, my Black pastor friend's great-grandfather was a sharecropper in Mississippi in a brutalizing environment.

In the wake of the Eric Logan shooting, I've also heard several stories of traumatic encounters Black neighbors have had with South Bend police officers over the course of the past decades. Each new event can re-traumatize.

I am struck by how as whites and Blacks, we can live very close to each other, yet our experiences and our worlds are so vastly different.

As a white person, I feel called to listen and learn, and to re-commit myself to work to create that "beloved community" where everyone is seen and heard, where each person has the opportunity to thrive and flourish, and where we strive to be in right relationship with each other. That may sound nice, but it can be very hard work. I invite us all to be on this journey together.

Community Outreach Team Update

The outreach team has been hard at work this summer - training new members, completing an asthma educator certification, and planning for an upcoming Community Health Worker training. Our new team members have wasted no time getting out in the neighborhood to meet our fine neighbors and continue our work educating families about lead hazards and how to live lead safe. The team hosted a Christmas in July/Free lead testing event for the Diamond Avenue neighbors. While the goal was to bring the testing to our neighbors, extreme heat and storms forced us to move to the Mary Grace Room. We hope to try more events like this in the coming months.

Home Lead Test kits are still available. Call the office and ask about this resource to help identify if your home may have lead hazards.

As we move into fall, the Outreach Team is planning to offer more family-friendly events as a way to build relationships with families, share what we know about lead hazards and asthma issues, and help connect people with resources. Our work remains focused on promoting health and wellbeing for our neighbors - healthy kids, healthy families, healthy community.
