Your household counts for all of us! Fill out Census 2020

Neighbors, by now you likely have received your Census forms or online codes in the mail. Quite simply – you are required to fill them out. We also urge you to fill them out. Results from the Census influence how \$650+ billion in annual funds are distributed across the country. Programs affected by the census include: National School Lunch Program, Head Start, Section 8 Housing Choice Vouchers, Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), and Medical Assistance Program among many other funding count areas.

But what about my privacy?

By Federal law, Census responses are confidential and cannot be shared with anyone, including law enforcement, immigration, and tax agencies.

How do I fill out the census?

You'll be able to respond online, by mail, or by phone. If you don't want to or can't respond in those ways, a Census worker will safely check on the status of your Census form and help get it completed.

What is Census Day?

Census Day was April 1, 2020. This means that you'll fill out your Census form based on your household on that date.

Spring Cleaning and Playing, With Lead Safety in Mind

Although it is snowing as I write this, the blooming crocuses tell me that Spring is just around the corner. At my house, that means opening the windows to get fresh air, and lots of time spent rediscovering our yard with my kids. This is the time of year too, when we have to be awake to the fact that our homes may have lead hazards that can be really harmful to children under 7 and pregnant or nursing mothers. Taking some easy precautionary steps can ensure that our little ones do not get lead poisoning.

- Use a wet dust cloth on all horizontal surfaces, especially windowsills. Many older windows were painted with lead paint. When you open and close them, this can create dangerous lead dust. If you can't avoid opening and closing windows, be sure to wet dust the sills and the window wells very frequently to reduce the amount of lead dust getting into your home.
- Avoid playing in bare soil. Mulch or brick pavers are a relatively inexpensive way to cover over any soil that might have lead in it.
- Avoid playing in bare feet outdoors, or if your child does, wash feet before going back inside.
- Wash hands frequently. This is a sure way to keep any lead that your child may have come into contact with from getting into their bodies.
- Don't wear shoes in the house - this can track in any contaminated soil from outdoors. Instead, take off shoes outside, or store them near the main doors.
- Make sure your child is tested for lead regularly. Don't wait for your doctor to offer to do a lead screening - ask them. You can say, "I live in a home built before 1978, and I know that many children in my neighborhood have had levels of lead in their bodies. I would like to get a lead screening done."
- Cover chipping or peeling paint. DO NOT SAND. There are a couple of temporary things you can do to cover chipping and peeling paint that you suspect or know has lead in it. For smaller areas, you can cover it with tape or contact paper, or paint over it with latex paint.
- Eat a diet high in Calcium, Iron and Vitamin C to reduce the effect or absorption of lead from environmental sources

If you are concerned about lead hazards in your home there are some options. You can get a Home Lead Screening Kit from the NNN Community Outreach Team: call 574-232-9182. You can also request a free lead risk assessment from the County Health Department: 574-235-9582



Lead Grants Available

Funding is still available through the City of South Bend for grants to income-qualified homeowners for lead abatement or interim controls that make your housing safer. Property owners and landlords that rent to income-qualified tenants may qualify for grants or forgivable loans.

Who is eligible? Renters and homeowners who earn less than 80% of median income (\$54,000 for a family of 4). Demolition Safety

Did you know that when a house is being demolished, it is supposed to be sprayed with water during the demolition process? That is the policy in the City of South Bend. This process of "wet demolition" is for neighborhood and contractor safety.

Demolitions can release toxic dust into the air, and this toxic dust can travel up to 400 feet! Using water during demolition is a way to limit how much of this dust travels from the demolition site onto cars, porches, furniture and windowsills, into yards and gardens and onto children's' play things.



Yet, we know that demolitions in our neighborhood do not always include these precautions. If you see a demolition happening without water actively being sprayed, here is what you can do:

- Call IDEM: IDEM (574) 245-4870 ASAP. This is the safe demo enforcement agency, and they MUST witness the problem to act on it. Call them so they can send an inspector.
- Can't remember their number? Call us, we'll call IDEM. (574-232-9182)
- Then make any other complaint you want (311, etc.).
