Food Dessert? Not when there are CSAs

SA is an acronym for Community Supported Agriculture. It's a model of farming, distribution and marketing that started in the 1960's in Japan, quickly gaining traction in Europe and the Americas. CSA has evolved over the years to include several models that are individually tailored to the farms and communities they serve. At it's heart, CSA is a way for consumers to buy local, seasonally fresh food directly from a farmer. Of course, people have been getting produce from local farmers for as long as there have been farms. The main innovation of the CSA is the way it distributes risk and reward among the entire community, including the farmer.

Tips on communicating with the Police

he City of South Bend's Nuisance Officer, Pfc.
Jim Burns, wants to advise neighbors to
consider the following tips when
communicating with the Police:

- Don't be shy to call 911 for some activity happening: Shots fired, burglary, something currently happening or just happened. It's never a "bother."
- If something happened hours ago or is clearly not an urgent call, don't call 911; call the non-emergency number: (574) 235-9201.
- If you suspect drug sale activity or have other concerns about properties or activities in the neighborhood, you can help create a paper trail. Please call the non-emergency number or call 574-235-9401 or email Pfc Jim Burns (jburns@southbendin.gov). Neighbor reports can help a tremendous amount. You can report anonymously or use Crime Stoppers at (574) 288-STOP.
- If you have a Ring camera, you can have it registered with the Police. Ask Pfc Burns how.



Living Lead Safe in the NNN

he NNN, as we well know, was mainly built out within the first half of the 20th century. Today, the typical age of homes in the NNN is over 100 years old! While older homes and buildings add to the uniqueness of life in the NNN, they also pose a number of risks. Houses built prior to 1978 are likely to contain lead based paint. Left to wear and tear from many years of occupancy, this paint gets into the house's dust and soil. From there it can be accidentally, or unknowingly ingested or inhaled by children and adults. Children under the age of 7 are especially vulnerable to lead poisoning, which leaves irreversible brain damage.

The good news is that you can take steps to "Live Lead Safe" in your home. The first thing to do is to learn more about your home environment. The University of Notre Dame offered Free Lead Screening Kits to anyone interested in the County. Lead screening kits are available for pick up at the NNN Offices.

In addition to screening your home, it's important to have your child tested for lead through your healthcare provider or by contacting the St. Joseph County Health Department.
