

# **Brownfield Park Renamed to Stephen J. Luecke Park**

he City of South Bend hosted a ribbon cutting and dedication ceremony for the naming of Stephen J. Luecke Park and Coal Line Trail, which is the former Brownfield Park and Coal Line Trail. Phase I of the Coal Line Trail – the western boundary of the NNN - was completed this year. Brownfield Park was named after a prominent South Bend citizen, and is now renamed to honor a more recent prominent South Bend citizen, and NNN neighbor.

Mayor Stephen J. Luecke was the longest serving mayor in South Bend's history from 1997-

2011. Some of Mayor Luecke's most notable accomplishments as mayor included comprehensive brownfield remediation efforts, the implementation of smart sewers and the restoration of the Morris and Palais Royale. Mayor Luecke also renewed the City's focus on the beauty of the St. Joseph River, paving the way for many of the riverfront paths, development, and outdoor spaces we cherish today.

## **Unity Garden Recap 2022**

ur Chapin Park Unity Garden had a great year. The concrete-block raised beds remain sturdy and productive, and we raised a lot of healthy food to pick for free. The best crops were this spring's thousands of strawberries, the summer's kale and lettuces, and autumn's bounty of tomatoes and okra. And our three apple trees

produced a bunch of delicious, lumpy spotted fruit that Joni Mitchell would have approved of.

It was a hot summer! Our Wednesday evening volunteer gatherings didn't happen very often because of that. We need to devise a better, more flexible plan for community participation. But student volunteers from St. Joseph's High school showed up twice in September: they helped restore the brick sidewalks to a nearly weed-free condition and helped eradicate invasive plants from the wild area.

Unity Gardens' Mitch and Sara gave excellent fall classes on crop rotation and putting your garden to bed. Practicing what they preached, we piled cardboard, mulch and straw, and well-aged horse manure on the raised beds, which will all break down into good soil by spring. And in the spring, we will rotate the crops. Tomatoes will go in the ground, not in a raised bed. We'll switch the root



crops with the beans. We will plant the peppers for afternoon shade. We will learn how to grow spinach! And we will work on better signage so volunteers can show up on their own and know what needs to be done.

Thanks to every volunteer and to the Unity Gardens and to the City of South Bend, who all make this wonderful endeavor possible. - Molly B. Moon, Chapin Park Unity Garden leader
